Chickens have been hatched artificially in Egypt and China for cen-turies. Methods of heating them have not changed to any extent in eithe country. Thermometers for testing beat are not in general use there, the eggs being tested by touch of hand or eyelld. Heat is supplied by burning charcoal or by pixelng the incub in a pile of decomposing manure.
