CHEROKEE SPENDS \$7,437 FOR RELIEF DURING MARCH

Cherokee County relief oganiza-ation spent \$7,437 for relief in the therease county rener ogains atton spent \$7,437 for relief in the largest sum which has been spent in this county during any one month, although an improvement in the status of destitution in North Caro-lina was indicated in the total mount of money spent in the state for relief purposes during March, ac-cording to an announcement made this week by the Governor's Office of relief. The total expenditure for the state amounted to \$1,323,346. This total represents an increase over the expenditures for February which required \$1,166,432. By tak-ing into account the fact that March contains three more days than Feb-mary, the fact is revealed that the total very. State relief officers regard this as an encouraging sign because of the fact that the banking holiday during March caused a larger expenditure in many instances than would have been time ordinarily. ENGINEERS TO MAKE SURVEYS

Governments Experts In Murphy Area To Map Territory

Five topographic engineers of the United Stat & Geological survey, with their Assistant, have arrived in Mur-phy, from Washington, D. C., to make surveys for the topographic mapping of approximately 250 square miles of territory lying to the north and west of Murphy. The topographic map of this visi-

territory lying to the north and west of Murphy. The topographic map of this vici-nity, embracing 15 minutes of lati-tude and longitude, will be published on a scale of one inch to the mile which contour lines showing differ-ence of elevation of 50 feet. In addition to preliminary loca-tion for highways, railways, trails, and reservoir sites being made direct from these topographic maps, they serve as a base for studies and plans of the mineral agricultural timber and water resources of the country. No especial significance is at-tached to the presence of the en-gineers in Murphy, other than the pursuit of a program, adopted some 5 years ago by the United States Geological survey, of making a topo-graphic map of the United States which at the present time is about one-half completed.

one-half completed. A system of triangulation is being extended from the vicinity of Duck-town, Tenn., by Major C. B. Ken-dall, while the spirit level network for the area is being executed by C. A. Turner. The topographic work is in charge of K. W. Trimble, assist-ed by R. F. Mamke and C. W.
