the term will be taken up with the trial of criminal cases.

The criminal docket in Cherokee has been crowded for the past several terms, and the entire two weeks of the last term of court was taken up with the trial of criminal cases, and many hast to be continued becase the court did not have the time to dispose or them, court officials said. Usually the first is taken up with the criminal docket while the second week is devoted to hearing civil cases.

A check of the criminal docket for this term reveals that among the 262 cases on for this term, 185 were continued from the last August term. A number of these have been continued since 1930, while 40 of them have never been tried. Of the 185 continued cases, 33 are represented by seifas.

An analysis of the docket shows that violations of the prohibition law leads the list of crimes with 81 cases, while assault with deadly weapons tanks a cond with 34. Three cases charging murder are listed, while the other cases are made up of charges of lerceny, carrying concealed weapons, using profane language, disturbing religious conference one, att.
