Funeral Services Held Sunday Afternoon, December 9th At Tomotla

Funeral services for Mrs. Glenn Farmer, 34 of Hazelwood, who died Saturday morning, December 8th, at 12:40 o'clock in the Franklin hospital following an operation Wednesday, was held Sunday afternoon Dec. 9th at 1:30 o'clock at the home of her father, J. T. Hayes, of Tomotla, conducted by the Rev. J. H. Carper, pastor of the Murphy Methodist circuit, assisted by the Rev. T. F. Higgins, pastor of the Methodist church. Interment was in the Tomotla cemetery.

Three members of the Brasstown Craft Guild recently carved animals to fill an order for the first lady of the land, Mrs. Roosevelt, who has always had a great interest in handicrafts, visited six times the Corcoran Gallery in Washington where the Southern Highland Handicraft Guild has had a very lovely exhibition for the past month. Mrs. Roosevelt's order included a flock of seven geese carved by Haden Hensley, a running dog by Bill Waldroup and a running rabbit, the work of Mr. J. O. Penland. The first two carvers have been students at the Folk School. Mr. Penland's son Hollis and daughter Frankie have also been students. Mr. Penland is a member of the advisory committee of the school.

Mr. Allen Eaton of the Russell Sage Foundation in New York, the advisor of the Southern Highland Handicraft Guild, spent many months assembling the exhibit which he and Mr. White, president of the American Federation of Arts, both declare the most beautiful exhibition of American crafts ever assembled in this country. The Folk School is one of 28 members of the Guild which came into being through the vision of Mrs. Campbell. Since its organizing four years ago Marguerite Butler has been on the board of directors also its first president.
