Wood Hatchery Preparing For Largest Output

The Wood Hatchery at Woodville, near Andrews, is making preparations this year for the largest output in its four years of operation. The hatchery, is owned and operated by Mrs. C. B. Wood, is the only commercial hatchery in extreme Western North Carolina. More than 5,000 baby chicks were sold last year.

Mrs. Wood maintains a flock of 225 white Leghorns hens which have been carefully culled and blood tested by state specialist. In addition to hatching eggs obtained from her own flock she also hatches Barred Rocks and Rhode Island Reds.

Mrs. Wood believes that farm women could profitably give more to the raising of poultry not only as an item in the family diet but as a steady source of income as well.



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
