Answer: All highly flavored feeds, such as rye and turnips, should always be fed after miking as they will impart an objectionable odor to the milking. All roughage should also be fed after milking. Care should be also be taken to keep wild onions away from the animals, especially in the late fall and early spring. The cows should be taken off pasture and given a dry feed for at least six hours before milking at these times.
