

TVA Film To Be Shown Here Free Of Charge To Crowd Sunday Afternoon

PICTURE GAINED MUCH ACCLAIM IN LARGE CITIES

A special film depicting all phases of the work of the Tennessee Valley Authority will be shown at the Murphy theater Sunday afternoon at 2:30. It is being sponsored by the Cherokee Scout. No admission will be charged.

The picture, a full length film, shows actual construction work going on at the various projects being undertaken by the TVA at this time. It reviews the work of the institution since it first began and outlines clearly the purpose of the entire set-up.

The picture was obtained through J. D. Blagg, unit chief in charge of the local TVA surveys, and is being shown through the courtesy of P. J. Henn, owner of the local moving picture house, and Jim McCombs, the manager.

The TVA picture has been received enthusiastically in the many large city show houses where it has been put on the screen. All critics have given it credit as being one of the best pictures of its kind.

In that the picture is entirely educational it will be shown here free of charge and it will be run over until everyone who cares to has seen it through.

A great deal of interest seems to have been stirred up in this section over the fact that the picture will be shown here and large crowds are expected from all over the county and surrounding communities.

From the beginning to the end interesting scenes are shown of the actual construction on dams, their proposed locations, and the work the TVA is doing in the social field. Music is furnished throughout by the United States Marine band.

Everyone is urged to come to the Murphy theater Sunday afternoon and see this unusual picture. Interesting and delightful it will give many a new view as to the actual work going on under the Tennessee Valley Authority.

R. B. WOOTEN HERE TO HELP IN COUNTY AGENT'S CAPACITY

Mr. R. B. Wooten, of Chester, S. C., arrived here Sunday to take up his duties as assistant Cherokee county agent.

Mr. Wooten said his work would be principally taken up with service in connection with the TVA demonstration farms and 4-H club work as well as performing the other duties in the line of a county agent's work.

The 4-H club work, a vital part of the agricultural interests of any section, will be intensified, according to present plans.

Mr. Wooten comes here well equipped to do this type of work having spent a number of years in the field of agriculture. He is a graduate of the North Carolina State College at Raleigh, class of 1929, and for the past several years has been connected with the U. S. soil erosion service at Spartanburg, S. C.

DICKEY CHEVROLET CO. IS TO REMODEL PRESENT BUILDING

WOULD PROHIBIT ANY FISHING IN SHULER'S CREEK

Raleigh, March 16.—Representative C. E. Hyde, of Cherokee county, is the sponsor of a bill to prohibit fishing in the waters of Shuler's Creek, in Cherokee county.

The bill, referred to the house committee on commercial fisheries, provides "that the taking of fish in any manner whatsoever, either by rod, seine, gill, trap or by the shooting of dynamite, in the waters of Shuler's Creek, in Cherokee county, or any tributaries thereof, is hereby prohibited for a period of two years from and after the passage of this act."

It provides for a punishment of not more than 30 days or fine of not more than \$50.

GRAY'S MEASURE ON CLAY RECORDS PASSED IN HOUSE

Raleigh, March 16.—The house today passed Representative T. C. Gray's bill providing for the re-establishment of certain judgment dockets that have been stolen or removed from the office of the Clay county Superior Court clerk.

Given a favorable report yesterday by house committee on judiciary No. 2 and passed by the house today, the measure provides for the clerk, under supervision of the local bar, to reconstruct the docket from judgment rolls, minute dockets, and other official records. It also provides that the commissioners pay for the work, no to affect existing legal rights and effective May 15.

"Section 1. Certain judgment dockets to be reestablished. That the clerk of the superior court of Clay county, under the supervision and direction of the attorneys at law constituting the local bar of Clay county, is hereby directed to docket in new and convenient book or books, with convenient index thereto, or in accordance with the general index now existing and of record in said office, all judgments, decrees, motions, orders and all other entries as nearly as possible and in the same order as were of record in said original judgment dockets 'E' and 'G' that have been stolen, taken and removed from said office.

"Section 2. From what source reestablished. That said clerk of the superior court of Clay county shall copy and prepare the new record or records herein directed to be reestablished and set up by using the following records of the office of the clerk of the superior court of Clay county:

(a) Original files and judgment rolls of record in said office.

(b) Minute dockets of said court of record in said office.

(c) All other duly authenticated, pertinent and official records.

(d) The said clerk, when copy of any of the entries contained in said stolen judgment dockets 'E' and 'G' cannot be located in said office or obtained from the source mentioned, shall, if there is in existence any copy thereof or any part of the same duly certified and authenticated, upon presentation to him of such copy record said copy as a part of the records herein provided to be reestablished. If the copy so certified shall be on file or constitute a part of a record of a case or otherwise of another court, either state or federal then said certified copy, when so recorded as aforesaid, shall be returned to the court from which same was taken and shall not be required to remain on file in the clerk's office when so recorded."

MAN IS FATALLY HURT WHEN TWO TRUCKS COLLIDE

Homer Lovinggood Dies From Result Of Injuries Near Here Thursday

Homer Lovinggood, 26, of the Ebenezer community, was fatally injured Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock when a truck, on which he was riding, was struck by another truck three and a half miles out on the road to Unaka. With his legs badly crushed he was taken to the Petrie hospital by Tom Kephart, driver of the truck that struck him, where he died at 8:30. He was so weak from loss of blood that surgeons could not amputate his legs as was first reported.

Mr. Lovinggood was riding with his legs dangling off the left side of truck driven by Vester Kora which was sideswiped by the other truck driven by Kephart while rounding a sharp curve.

Following investigation, Deputy Sheriff Poley Bell served warrants for manslaughter on the two drivers who posted bonds each of \$500. A hearing will be held here Saturday.

Funeral services were held at the Hangingdog Baptist church Saturday morning at 11 o'clock with the Rev. W. H. Truett officiating.

Mr. Lovinggood, who was born in the Hangingdog community, had been a member of the Baptist church for 15 years.

Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dent Lovinggood, of Ebenezer, he is survived by one brother, Dock, of Raleigh Springs, and five sisters; Mrs. Tillie Nickerson, of Gastonia, Mrs. Ivey Davis, of Morganton, Ga.; Mrs. Viola Beaver of Atlanta, Ga., and Misses Ethel and Gladys Lovinggood, of Ebenezer.

MAYOR EXTENDS INVITATION TO GOV. TALMADGE

Mr. W. D. Townson said he had a conversation with Georgia representative R. T. Hampton, of Blue Ridge, Ga., who intimated that the governor was anxious to come here and speak on the occasion.

It is understood that Gov. Talmadge will bring a motorecade with him and plans are being made to form a motorecade here to meet him at the Georgia line. In all probability there will be a big celebration with special events here on the speaking date.

It is estimated that there is no auditorium here to hold the multitude that would want to hear the governor speak, and attempts will be made to have him bring his sound system along and in the event of good weather the speech will be made outside possibly in the baseball park.

Attempts will be made to have North Carolina officials here on the occasion.

HIGHWAY NO. 28 BEING WIDENED AND RECOVERED

Work was begun Wednesday to widen State highway No. 28 to 18 feet from the Hiwassee bridge in Murphy to the intersection of the new road to the Georgia line at Kanger, 8 miles from here. Grover Mauney, Cherokee-Clay county superintendent of the highway department, said Wednesday.

The road, when the shoulders are completed, will be repaved with asphalt, he added.

A squad of men under J. L. Truett are working on the Murphy end of the road already, and Mr. Mauney said the work should be completed in two or three weeks.

TVAC CONTRACTS BEING EXPLAINED IN CLAY COUNTY

CAR IS STOLEN AND WRECKED ON SUNDAY EVENING

E. R. Thompson, local cannery manager, Sunday night celebrated the second week of his stay in Murphy, by finding that his car was stolen.

Parking his Ford in front of R. W. Gray's home on Valley River avenue where he was visiting Mr. and Mrs. A. Q. Ketter, he discovered about 9 o'clock that it was missing.

Calls describing the car were sent to surrounding towns and the manhunt, some three or four cars strong, was on.

The car was discovered about 12:30 wrecked near the Southern depot. Evidently the driver had hardly been able to make the turn at the railroad tracks and in an effort to keep it in the road had run into a pile of logs. The two front wheels were smashed.

Investigation showed that the lock had been picked with a fingernail file and the switch was still on when the car was found. Local police reported that arrests were near.

Further investigation showed that attempts on the part of the burglars to start the car of S. W. Mendenhall, Mountain Valley Creamery assistant were unsuccessful.

ALL SCHOOLS OF THREE COUNTIES ARE TO COMPETE

Approximately 150 Cherokee, Clay and Graham county students will be here Wednesday to take part in the tri-county athletic meet to be held at the local ball park. The events will begin at 12:30 (CST).

The meeting, which will be an annual affair, was started by the Tri-county Teachers Association and is being sponsored and fostered by the coaches of all the schools in the three counties.

Five events have been arranged for the girls and nine will be held for the boys. The winning school will be judged on the 5, 3, 1-point system.

It was announced that there would be no admission charged to the events and that everyone was welcomed to attend.

It is believed that through this plan every child in the schools of the three counties will have a chance to compete in some form of sport that would be denied him otherwise. Last year a similar meet was held at the local school and it proved so popular that plans were made to incorporate the three counties this year.

The boys events are: 100-yard dash, baseball throw, standing broad jump, 220-yard dash, 440-yard run, running broad jump, 880-yard relay, high jump and mile run.

The girls events are: 60-yard dash, baseball throw, standing broad jump, running broad jump and the high jump.

HUNTING BILL IS GIVEN APPROVAL IN LEGISLATURE

Raleigh, March 15.—The senate Friday added its approval to the house bill extending the open season to hunt quail, squirrel, and rabbits in nine western counties.

The senate adopted a committee amendment eliminating Macon county from its provisions, and it is expected that the house will concur in the amendment.

The measure amends section 32 of chapter 422, public laws of 1933, and fixes the open season for squirrel, September 15 to December 15; rabbits, November 20 to February 1, and quail, November 20 to February 1, in the following counties; Buncombe, Jackson, Swain, Clay, Cherokee, Graham, Haywood, Henderson, and Transylvania counties.

It provides further: "That it shall be lawful to hunt foxes at any time in Swain, Jackson, Clay, Cherokee, Graham, Buncombe, Haywood, Henderson and Transylvania counties.

"That it shall be unlawful and constitute a misdemeanor to sell squirrel for the market or otherwise, or to sell the same to any hotel or restaurant, or to any person or persons, in said counties.

"That any person or persons violating the provisions of section three of this act shall be fined not more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars, or imprisoned not more than 30 days in the discretion of the court.

"That all laws and clauses of laws in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

"That this act shall be in full force and effect from and after its ratification."

Town Property Bill Is Recommended To House

Representative Hyde's bill to exclude certain properties from the town limits of the town of Murphy has been recommended to the house committee on judiciary No. 1 upon motion of the author.

Mr. Hyde explained to the house that it is possible a mistake has been made in the description, and he asked that it be returned to the committee for correction.
