# Dodge Dealers' Sales Pile Up New Record

Detroit, April 17.—Retail deliveries of passenger cars and trucks so far reported for the week ending March 9 continues the rising tendency that has marked them for the past two and a half months.

The week's analysis of sales activities, made by the office of A. van DerZee, general sales manager of Dodge Division of Chrysler Motor, states that Dodge dealers' retail deliveries of new vehicles in the 6-day period amounted to 6,960; of these, 5,977 were Dodge and Plymouth passenger cars and 983 were Dodge commercial cars and trucks. The week's increase over the turnover of the preceding week is 263 units or 3.5 percent.

Deliveries by Dodge dealers in the first ten weeks of 1935 were 44,794 Dodge and Plymouth passenger cars and 7,859 Dodge commercial cars and trucks—making a total of 52,740 retail sales. This total, exceeding the record of the first ten weeks of 1934 by 22,889 vehicles, indicates a gain in favor of the present year's business of 76.7 percent.

The sales volume of Dodge dealers' new car and truck deliveries for the week ending March 9, totaling 6,960 units, closely paralleled by 6,659 used-vehicle sales made during the same period.

During the week covered by the latest delivery report, the factory received a daily output of 1,300 passenger cars and trucks and passed an important production milestone by building the 3-millionth Dodge.
