MAYOR GRAY IS ELECTED INTO CLUB AT MEET

4. Resumed our annual custom of holding out-door meetings each time in the form of picnics, all the Lionesses and Lion Cubs present. We find that by doing this we can hold the interest of all the members during the summer months because the Lionesses see to it that the Lions are present.
5. Held a joint meeting with the Rotarians and Rotary Anns of our neighboring town of Andrews, N. C., at which time they entertained our club and the Lionesses.
6. Held a special meeting to entertain the Chairman of the State Highway Beautification Commission.
7. Directed and aided the Boy Scouts in a drive for more books for the public library. (Highly successful.)
8. Promoted a drive to have our annual county Fair for the fall of

The proposed celebration has stirred a great deal of interest in Murphy and surrounding towns and counties and hundreds of people are expected from Western North Carolina, Tennessee and Georgia on that date, Mr. Ellis said.

"This is by no means a celebration confined to one town", Mr. Ellis declared. "Every town and surrounding community has decided to participate in the program which is now under arrangements and they will all be represented as far as I can learn."

The tentative program calls for two ball games, parades and singing choirs. The Cherokees from Indian reservation have agreed to be here on that date and will take a large part in the festivities with their unique songs and ball games, Ellis said.
