#### Cherokee Indians Turning Out To Play Ball, Sing

Thousands of pleasure-bent citizens, coming from all over Cherokee and neighboring counties, are expected in Murphy Thursday, July 4, to take part in the most gigantic celebration ever staged in this county.

The gala event is being planned through the active cooperation of the outstanding citizens and chants in this community. All towns is the county are lending their in-valuable assistance to make the event a tremendous success and all plans under the direction of Luke Ellis have neared completion.

Outstanding among the days events are the glittering parade of floats at 9 o'clock in the morning and the two ball games—one with Haysville at 10 o'clock and the other with the Mable bat-busters at

3 c'clock. Packed with thrills will be the Indian baseball game at 1:45. Those who have witnessed the spectacle agree that it is the roughest and most exciting sport that has ever been played. Twenty-two fighting braves, playing a rough and tumble game just as they did when baseball as John Q. Citizen knows it had not yet been born. This feature alone is expected to draw hundreds to the scene of battle.

All of the Cherokee Indian reservation is turning out, it was said, and they will sing their weird songs for the public at 1:30.

The fair grounds, where most of the program will be held, will be fixed for an array of fun-provoking events such as climbing the greasy pole and catching the greasy pig.

A dog parade, under the direction of William P. Payne, will lead off the day's festivities.

Prizes will be awarded to the best floats. Up to press time the following had been entered: Murphy Lions club, Murphy Junior Womans club, Murphy Missionary Society, Murphy fire department and several Murphy merchants. The prizes will be \$7.50, \$5 and \$2.00. A large number from Andrews and other towns will be antered towns will be entered.

According to W. D. Whitaker, cashier of the Citizens Bank and Trust company, and chairman of the committee appointed to make plans for the celebration, Andrews will enter eight floats in the grand floral parade to take place through the main streets of Murphy at 9 o'clock. #### BLAIRSVILLE MAN CRUSHED TO DEATH BY LOG ON FRIDAY

Funeral services for Mr. Frank King, 56, of the Ivey Log communi-ty, who was crushed to death by a leg which he was attempting to load on a truck near Blairsville Friday morning were held at the Antioch Baptist church Saturday afternoon at 2 c'clock. Peyton G. Ivie was in charge of the body.

Mr. King died in the Petrie hospital at 10 A. M. after he had been conveyed here following the acci-dent. Severely injured internally he died 15 minutes after arriving at the local hospital. The accident occured about 8:30 Friday morning while he was attempting to load logs on a truck at his sawmill near Blairsville.

Born in Ala. he moved to Union county when he was a boy and had been one of that section's leading farmers ever since. He was a devoted member of the Baptist church since childhood.

Besides his widow he is survived by four brothers, Gene, Will, Claud and Aud, all of Marietta, Ga., and three sisters, Mrs. Ola Owenby and Mrs. Ernest Dunn, both of Kennesaw, Ga., and Mrs. William Allen, of South Georgia.

#### Cole, White Recovered: Are Conveyed to Homes

T. Cole and Sephus White, two men that were seriously injured when an automobile in which they were riding crashed into a telegraph pole in the city limits a month ago, were sufficiently recovered at the Petrie hospital Tuesday to be conveyed to their homes.

The latest news received was a wire to Mayor J. B. Gray from Norvell Wednesday morning which said that Congressman Weaver and Senator Bailey had been contacted and that "everything was very favor-able". A wire to the Scout from Senator Reynolds said he was appearing before the appropriations committee Tuesday morning but no word has yet been received as to the out come.

A senate sub-committee Monday heard strong pleas for including in the TVA appropriation for the fiscal year of 1936 sufficient money to get the proposed Hawassee dam under

construction according to an official report from Washington Tuesday. Senator Bailey, Senator Reynolds and Representative Weaver appeared before the sub-committee, which is headed by Senator Adams, of Colorado, and urged that the \$6,000-000 item struck from the estimated appropriation by the house appropriation committee, be put back in the

#### To Cost \$12,000,000
