(Continued from page one—This Sec. 24,712 teachers and principals in N. C. elementary and high school. The total school population was 1,099,798. 81.2 per cent of the population was enrolled.

There are more than thirty millions of young people enrolled in school. Education then is the greatest single spiritual enterprise in America. Our army of a million teachers is twice as large as that of all who devote themselves to religion, charity, law, art, and literature. The yearly outlay on education is two and a quarter billion dollars.

In N. C. there are 22 standard four-year colleges (white), 20 standard Junior colleges (white), one standard normal school for Indians, eight standard four-year colleges (colored), and five standard Junior colleges (colored).
