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FIVE PURE-BRED BULLS PLACED IN COUNTY BY BANK

Institution Spends Over \$1000 To Aid Tri-Cuunty Farmers

In a cooperative move to promote and encourage the rearing of a bet-ter grade of beef cattle in Cherokee, Clay, and Graham counties, the Citizens Bank and Trust Company has placed in two of these counties five thoroughbred bulls purchased from some of the foremost farm in the country and selected by the beef cat-tle specialist of North Carolina.

This work has been done largely through the work of P. B. Ferebee, president of the bank, and has been done in a cooperative spirit to assist the farmers of western North Carolina. The bank has purchased these animals at a cost of over \$1000, and is loaning them to the farmers with- Prominent Murphy Citiout cost. They are to be used for breeding purposes by all of the farmers in the community in which they are placed, and are under the pro-tection and care of the farmer with whom they are placed.
