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COUNTY HOME DISCONTINUED AFTER JULY 1

Dr. J. N. Hill To Be Retained as County Physician by Commissioners

The Cherokee county home will be discontinued as a county insti-tution July 1, the board of county commissioners decided in a special session here Tuesday.

Acting on a motion passed at their last regular meeting, the three-man board voted to retain Dr. J. N. Hill county physician but limited his duties to caring for inmates at the county jail in Murphy.

Reason for the two acts was given a desire to lower expenses in the the county budget and tax distri. bution at the meeting but did not me to any definite conclusion it was

With the advent of old age pensions the number of inmates at the county home has dwindled to six, and this was given as a reason for discontinuing it by W. A. Adams, member of

Mrs. Hayes Leatherwood, whose husband is superintendent county home, said following the meet. ing that three of the present six inmates were eligible for old age assis-

Mr. Adams stated is was estimated that each person staying at the county home end \$22 per month last year. He said those remaining there could be transferred to the Jackson county home and kept cheaper than provid-ing quarters for them in the Cherokee county home.
