The largest single shot of dynamite that has ever been set off at Hiwassee Dam—32,860 pounds, was used in a blast at the site of the TVA project Monday.

This is also believed to be the largest amount of dynamite ever used in a single shot in this part of the country.

Special powder company representatives oversee the work of these huge charges which take place in the excavation work at Hiwassee Dam regularly.

It is estimated the huge blast removed 109,000 tons of rock.
