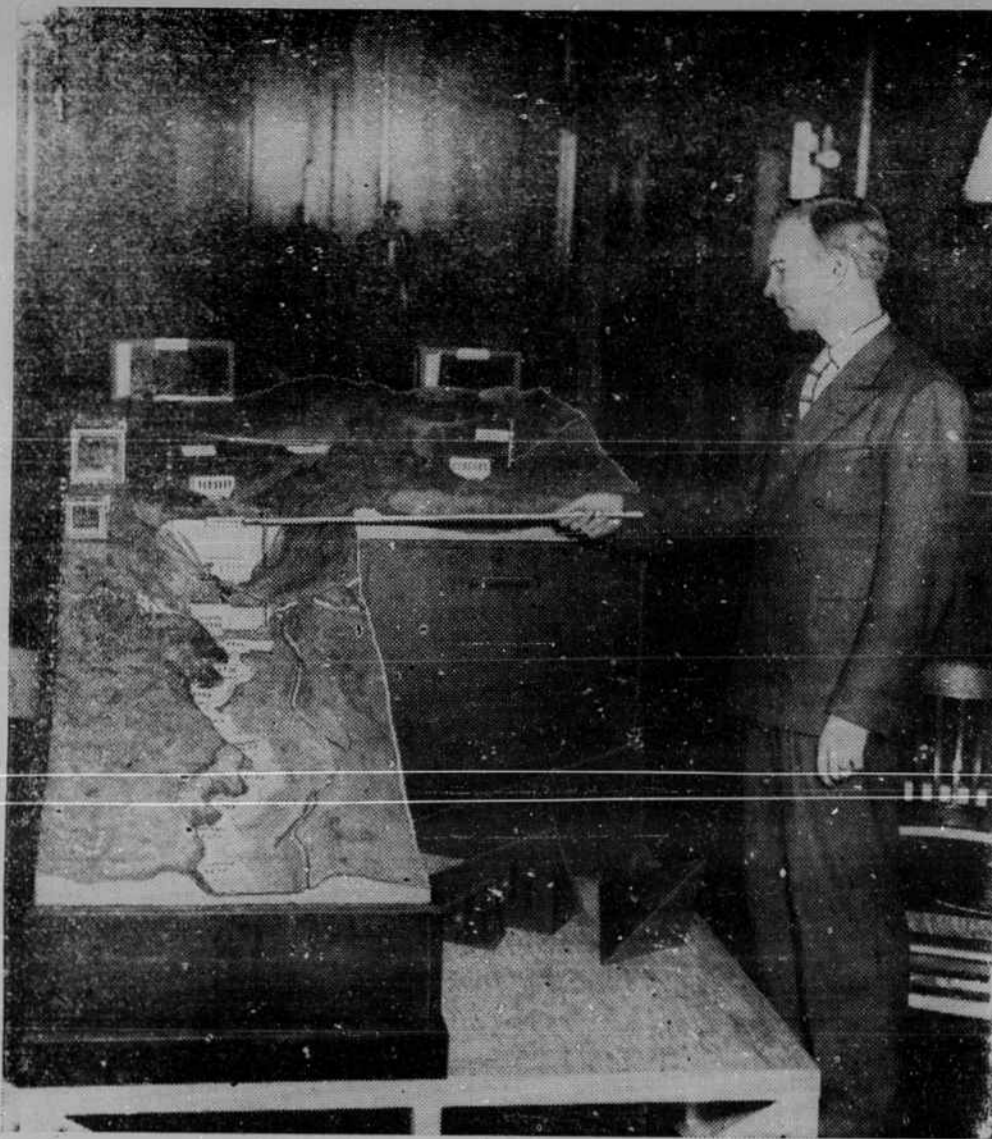


**Map Shows Proposed Hiwassee Power Project**



Four dams that the Southern States Power company claims it had planned to build on the Hiwassee river are shown in this topographical map of the Hiwassee valley. The map is being exhibited at the hearing of the TVA's condemnation suit against 12,000 acres of Hiwassee river valley property, in the U. S. district courtroom here. The Southern States company abandoned the power project when the TVA launched construction of its \$15,000,000 Hiwassee dam. The map was made in New York from drafts drawn by John Snyder, shown above, pointing to one of the proposed private dams.

**WESTERN UNION EMPLOYEES TO OBSERVE HOURS**

"The far reaching effects of the Fair Labor Standard Act was brought home to telegraph-users on October 24th, the effective date of the Act, when the local Western Union office had to shorten its working hours," it was announced by James Jamison, manager of the local office.

"The requirements of the Act impose a burden which the telegraph company is unable to meet," said Mr. Jamison, "and while it is the traditional desire of my company to serve the public when it wants to be served, we have no alternative under present business conditions but to shorten the hours. We have, however, arranged our open hours to give the maximum service to our customers. The office will open at 8 a. m. close from 12 to 1:18 p. m. and close for the day at 7 p. m. As an indication of the company's attitude towards its employees, Mr. Jamison said, "I will work fewer hours but my weekly pay envelop will not contain any less."

**SALVAGE TIMBER**

Steps to protect from fire the 4,000,000,000 feet of timber felled by the recent hurricane in the North-eastern states have been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. There is enough of the fallen timber to keep saw mills in those states busy for nearly five years.

**Dairy Herd Requires Proper Grain Mixture**

A grain mixture which contains from 1,400 to 1,500 pounds of digestible nutrients per ton is recommended as winter feed for a young dairy herd by J. A. Arey, dairy extension specialist at State College. "A good mixture should not contain more than 8 to 10 percent bifer, and should comprise four or more palatable feeds, which after mixing weigh about one pound per quart," he said.

A young dairy herd requires extra care as cold weather approaches, and poor feed and care during the winter months will result in stunted animals that can never develop into a high producing cow, Arey stated.

A grain mixture composed of two quarts corn meal, one part wheat bran, one quart ground oats and one part soybean, linseed or cotton seed meal is suggested for good results. In assembling a grain mixture on the farm or purchasing a ready-mixed feed, Arey advised that the following facts be kept in mind:

1. The mixture containing the largest number of pounds of digestible nutrients per ton is usually the most economical one.
2. The mixture should be palatable.
3. It should contain a variety of feeds.

4. It should be slightly bulky.
5. It should balance with the roughage to be fed. For example, a mixture containing around 16 per cent protein is suitable to be fed with a good legume hay; one containing around 20 percent protein is suitable for a mixed hay; and one containing about 24 percent protein should be used with a non-legume hay.
