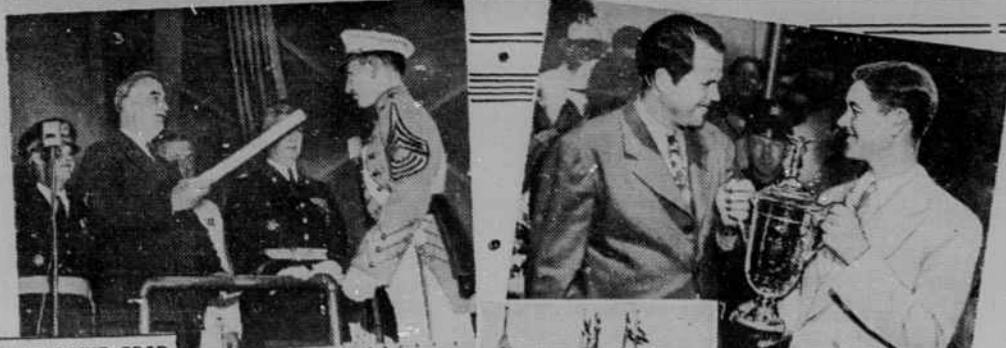

ham Bell and Thomas A Watson. A reproduction of the second telephone was likewise shown as well as latest models.

He described, in detail, the intricate apparatus necessary to carry on both land and overseas conversation. He had a large communications map of the world showing how it was possible for people in Murphy to talk to 70 different countries, 23 ocean liners in the Atlantic and one in the Pacific, or to 93 per cent of all telephones in the world.

He even demonstrated how today can talk to-morrow. He also had exhibits of modern telephones broken down into 183 separate and distinct parts, each essential to proper operation of the whole.

Mr. Russell had on display some interesting exhibits showing land and submarine telephone cables.

The tour moved from the library to the phone office, where Mr. Vestal explained how subscribers wires were brought into the central underground office and into the main distributing frame, where protection is provided against heavy electrical disturbances. Mr. Vestal told how the power plant, consisting of storage batteries, rectifiers, etc. played an important part in changing commercial power into telephone power, ringing machines etc.

Switch board operating was then demonstrated by Mrs. Brendle, showing just how the operators make the connections for local and long distance calls.

Finally guests were then shown the "voice mirror", a device that enables one to hear one's self as others hear him or her over the telephone. Visitors particularly enjoyed this feature.

Some evidently were pleased with their voices; others definitely, were not.

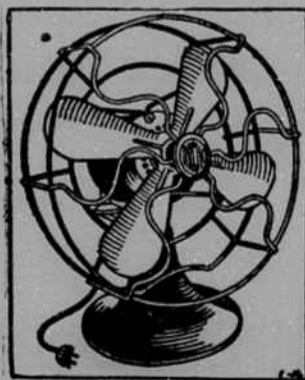
To The Tax Payers Of Cherokee County
