R. E. Greene, Aged 52, Dies Of Heart Attack

Stricken by a heart attack, Mr. R. E. Greene, prominent resident of Brasstown, died last Monday evening, at 6:30 o'clock. He was 52 years old. State Finds 9,054 jobs; 21 Given To Women

Jobs were found in 183 different types of industries by the State Employment Service during May. Of the 9054 persons placed, 55 percent went on construction jobs; 29 percent into service work; and six percent into manufacturing. In the last named group, textiles absorbed 60 percent.

The 23,691 applications received during the month came largely from agriculture, construction, and manufacture.

Of those placed, 79 percent were men and 21 percent women; 46 percent negro.
