Many awards are offered by the different departments of the North Carolina Federation of Womans Clubs, which will convene in Greensboro May 1, 2, and 3. The following are offered by the literature department:

In Drama: For the best one-act play, the Lanier cup. All manuscripts in this class to be sent to Miss Katherine Gaston, Belmont, N. C., sub-chairman.

In poetry: 1. For the best sonnet, the Federation Poetry cup; 2. For the best narrative poem, the Albert L. Berry cup. Manuscripts to Mrs. Henry D. Holoman, Rich Square, sub-chairman. (It must be stated for which cup the poem is offered; otherwise it will not be considered.)

Short story: For the best short story the Joseph P. Caldwell cup. (Short stories are limited to 6,000 words.)

Feature article: For the best feature article published in a newspaper or magazine between May 1, 1939 and March 19, 1940, the Federation cup.

Quantity production (as well as quality). To the club doing most creative work, a special award.

Rules: No manuscripts will be accepted after March 15.

It would be most commendable if several members of the local senior and junior woman's clubs entered these competitions. Probably we wouldn't win the first year, but we would acquire experience in writing down our thoughts.

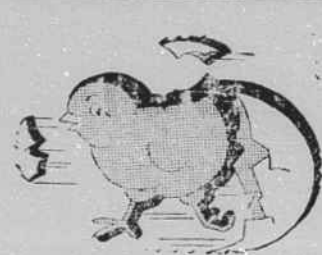
