**ROAD TO TOPTON TO BE FASTEST IN THIS SECTION**

**Six Mile Stretch Will Be Wide, Smooth, and Free From Curves**

The new section of route 19 between Andrews and Tipton is to be the fastest stretch of road in the extreme portion of North Carolina. Stretching approximately six miles, the new highway will be without sharp curves and will consist largely of long level, straight sections of pavement. The new road is replacing the crooked, narrow section of road in this part of the country. The right-of-way, purchased for the Tipton road, is 100 feet wide and, according to information given out, the road is to be approximately 10 feet wider than the Murphy-Andrews segment of the same highway. During the past two weeks the right-of-way has been cleared and some of the road graded. Drains and bridges have been completed, or are under construction. When the work is finished there will be a wide straight, smooth highway from Andrews to the Cherokee-Swain county line. Greater traffic safety will result. Several fatal accidents have occurred along the old road that were directly traced to its narrowness and its curves.

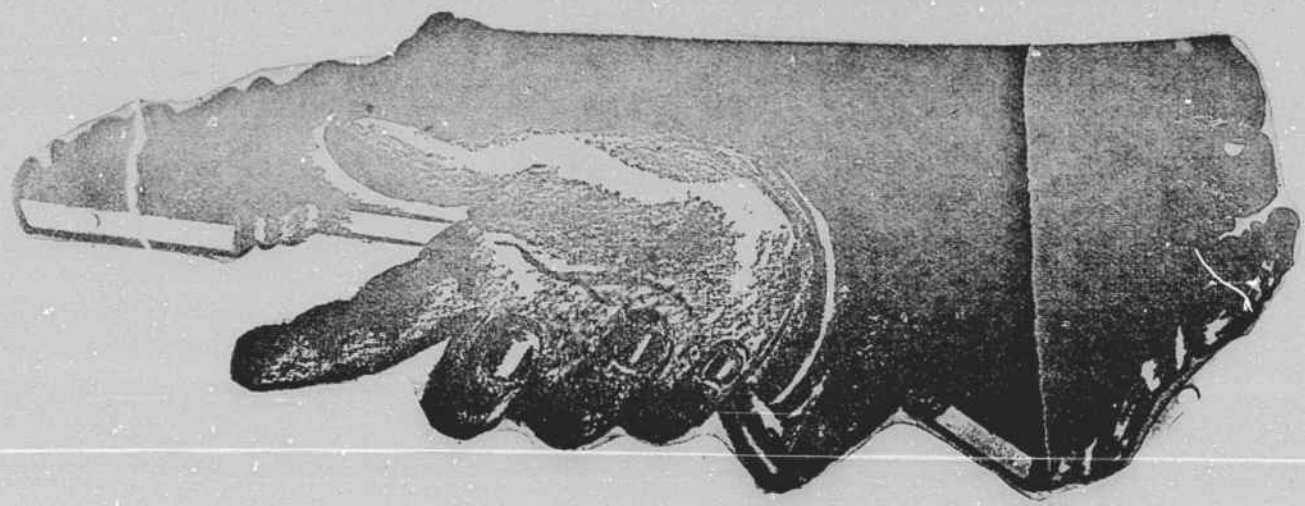
