Murphy Hi Defeats Robbinsville 18-0 In Tilt Here Friday

Murphy capitalized on two long touchdown passes and an intercepted pass to win their first home game over Robbinsville Friday afternoon 18-0.

The first marker registered by the Murphy team came on a 35-yard pass from Mallonee to Amos who ran 25 more yards to score. The second touchdown resulted from a 25-yard pass, Mallonnee to Ramsey, who galloped 40 yards for the tally again. Plott, Murphy center, intercepted a Robbinsville pass on the 25 yard line and ran it back to the four, from where Wilson plunged over for the final score.

Robbinsville made their only serious threat in the first period when they recovered a fumbled punt on Murphy's 25-yard line. The locals held for downs, however, and managed to keep the visitors on the other side of the center stripe for the remainder of the game.

Mallonnee, back, Amos, end, and Plott, center, were outstanding for the locals. The Murphy second team. which played the visitors for a large part of the game, also showed much strength.
