

## CONVENTION TO BE STAGED SOON BY FOXHUNTERS

### Healey Field To Be Scene of Meet Set For October 23-25

The Tri-State Fox Hunters of North Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee will hold their annual convention Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, October 23-24-25, at Healey Fields near Andrews. Charlie Calhoun, secretary, announced this week.

The bench show will be held Wednesday afternoon beginning at 2 o'clock, with an entry fee of \$1.00 for the first dog and 25 cents for each additional dog over six months of age, either sex. One prize will be given for the best looking dog under six months, either sex.

Races will be held all three nights of the meet climaxed by a daylight race Saturday morning for the derby dogs. Derby dogs are those who run in all three of the night races. A valuable prize will be given for the best running dog for the three nights.

The Friday night race will be for puppies under 15 months for a loosed fox. A red fox will be turned loose on Saturday morning for the derby.

Lunch stands will be provided on the race grounds all during the meet and plenty of shelter. Admission will be free.

## Election Of Committees In County Begun For Conservation Program

Ballots were distributed this week to all farmers of Cherokee county for the purpose of electing community and county committees and delegates in the Agricultural Conservation Program for the year 1941.

The ballots sent out by A. Q. Ketner, secretary to the county committee, carried suggestions to the farmers in choosing the committeemen according to ability and qualifications. A list of former committeemen also accompanied the letter.

Committees will be elected in Nolala, Hothouse, Valleytown, Beavertown, Shoal Creek and Murphy communities, along with alternates to serve in case of resignation or to act as delegates. Each of these committees is composed of three members.

All balloting in the election will end on October 12 at which time the committeemen and their position on the committee will be determined by the number of votes each receives.

## Murphy Hi Defeats Robbinsville 18-0 In Tilt Here Friday

Murphy capitalized on two long touchdown passes and an intercepted pass to win their first home game over Robbinsville Friday afternoon 18-0.

The first marker registered by the Murphy team came on a 35-yard pass from Mallonee to Amos who ran 25 more yards to score. The second touchdown resulted from a 25-yard pass, Mallonee to Ramsey, who galloped 40 yards for the tally again. Plott, Murphy center, intercepted a Robbinsville pass on the 25 yard line and ran it back to the four, from where Wilson plunged over for the final score.

Robbinsville made their only serious threat in the first period when they recovered a fumbled punt on Murphy's 25-yard line. The locals held for downs, however, and managed to keep the visitors on the other side of the center stripe for the remainder of the game.

Mallonee, back, Amos, end, and Plott, center, were outstanding for the locals. The Murphy second team, which played the visitors for a large part of the game, also showed much strength.

## COUNTY DRAFT BOARD CHOSEN IN MEET SATURDAY

### Registration To Be Held October 16 For Men Of 21-35 Years

A committee composed of J. W. Donley, clerk superior court, Lloyd Hendrix, superintendent of schools, and Clarence Hendrix, chairman of county board of elections, met Saturday, October 5, and recommended a group of men as advisory board for the draft registration October 16.

This board, as recommended to Governor Hoey, is as follows: Dr. R. S. Parker, Murphy, W. S. Dickey, Murphy, J. W. Lovingood, Murphy, Dr. J. N. Hill, Murphy, examining physician, and F. O. Christopher, appeal agent.

Registration of all men in Cherokee county between the ages of 21 to 35 will be held Wednesday, October 16, in the regular voting precincts all over the county. Regular election registration by county school teachers in the various precincts, will make the registrations.

Regulations governing the registration of county youths specifically set out that all men above 21 years of age or under 36 years of age must register. In the event a man is 35, he is still required to register until he reaches the age of 36.

All schools in the county unit will be closed for the registration as many of the precinct polling places are in school buildings. Also many of the teachers will necessarily be used in the registration. Registration for the two Murphy precincts will be held in the courthouse.

All members of the advisory board will have charge of and supervise all registration of draftees in this county. These men are giving their services without compensation.

## Broughton To Speak At County Democrat Rally On November 1

J. M. Broughton, democratic nominee for governor, has been secured as speaker for a Democratic rally to be held in the Murphy courthouse Friday night, November 1, according to H. A. Mattox, democrat county chairman.

Although arrangements have not been completed yet, Mr. Mattox stated, several other party officials and candidates are expected to take part, including Zebulon Weaver, congressman, Edwin Whitaker, candidate for state senator, and J. D. Mallonee Jr., candidate for house of representatives.
