Hoey, Broughton Speak At Meet Of Welfare Workers

R. B. Morphew and Noah Millsaps, members of the Graham County Welfare Board and M. J. Lyman, Supt., were in Raleigh attending a meeting on Wednesday of this week.

Governor Clyde R. Hoey and Democratic gubernatorial nominee, J. Melville Broughton, headlined the one-day joint conference of county welfare board members, county superintendents of public welfare, and members of the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare, when officials from all North Carolina counties met in Raleigh during the Fair Week meeting, October 9. The governor and the prospective governor spoke at the luncheon meeting held at the Carolina Hotel.

Col. W. A. Blair, Winston-Salem, chairman of the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare, spoke at the morning session on the history, development and duties of county welfare boards.

An open forum in which members of county welfare boards participated in discussion of common problems relating to the welfare programs in their respective counties was a feature of the session.

Nathan H. Yelton, director of public assistance and secretary of the State Board of Allotments and Appeal, discussed the problem of financial administration in public welfare.

WHICHARD QUITS HEALTH POST TO SERVE IN ARMY

Called To Service As Surgeon In Chief Of State Nat. Guard

First in this section to be called to the colors, Major Murray P. Whichard, health officer for Cherokee, Graham and Clay Counties left Saturday for a year of active service on the staff of Adjutant General J. Van B. Metts, with headquarters at Raleigh. Major Whichard will have direct supervision over appointment of medical examiners for draft boards throughout the State.

Maj. Whichard went from Murphy to Fort Bragg for a physical examination expected to last several days. His station in Raleigh will follow, and he probably will be pointed in the State Capital by his family.

During his absence, the post here will be filled by Dr. Fletcher Adams, recently connected with the Health Office at Winston Salem. Dr. Adams appointment here will be temporary, and no other changes in the personnel of the office will be made.

Major Whichard is a veteran of the World War of 1917, when he served as First Lieutenant in the Medical corps. In 1922 he organized the 115th Ambulance company of the N. C. National Guard, was promoted to a Captaincy, and commanded the company. In 1934 he was promoted to Major and named Chief Surgeon of the State National Guard. It is in the latter capacity that he has been called to active service.
