CHAMBER PLANS DINNER MEETING THURSDAY, DEC. 5

Regular Meeting Is Held at Town Hall Monday Evening

Plans were made for a second larger dinner meeting of members and prospective members of the Murphy Chamber of Commerce at its regular meeting Monday night, the dinner to be staged on Thursday night, December 5, at the Regal hotel.

An extra effort will be made to encourage old members and new members alike to attend the meeting Thursday with the purpose in mind regaining the strength, which in a report by Dr. E. L. Holt, treasurer, seems to be waning.

Plans were also advanced for testing the actual strength of the body with regards to employing a full-time secretary. Dr. Holt has been very active in trying to get such a man, and has contacted a possible candidate for the job who will be present for Thursday's meeting.

A special added attraction of the meeting will be the showing of moving pictures of the football game played between the Murphy and Bryson City teams at Bryson City two weeks ago.

Toward the end of the meeting Mr. T. G. Murdock, assistant state geologist, was introduced by Mr. C. W. Savage. Mr. Murdock spoke briefly on the mineral resources of the state and particularly of Cherokee county, expressing the opinion that a great deal of reasearch will be done in this section within the near future.

A thorough study of iron and manganese has been made in this area already, according to the geologist, large amounts of which are Citing Cherokee and Clay counties to be found in Cherokee county, as two of only 16 counties in North Carolina which contain deposits of manganese. Mr. Murdock expressed the opinion that development of this particular mineral would be profitable in that 14 pounds of manganese is used to every ton of steel manufactured.

The geologist also stated that a great amount of research would be

done in this section with regards to the copper deposits, and the development of the iron.
