Two new unit demonstration farmers have been installed in Cherokee county, A. Q. Ketner, county agent, announced this week. They are Leonard Jones, of Liberty, and L. W. Shields, of Sunny Point.

Both Jones and Shields are using a new type of phosphate, known as fused rock phosphate, for demonstration in legumes, pastures and meadows. Jones secured 5,900 pounds of phosphate through the program, and Shields got 7,800 pounds.

perty hauling vehicles to 50 miles an hour, and would require use of governors to prevent higher speeds. Another transportation bill would place a 90 day minimum sentence for second convictions for driving while drunk or under the influence of narcotics. Last week's bill to grant right of eminent domain for establishment of union bus stations was tabled.

An agricultural measure would require a veterinary at point of shipment to certify hogs imported into the State are free of hog cholera or other infectious diseases. Another measure would change the license tax for retail seed dealers to \$5 yearly, where bulk seed sales are under \$500.

An appropriation of \$600,000 was asked to build a tuberculosis sanitarium on a site already acquired near Wilson, N. C.

A bill was offered to provide \$100,000 annually to aid and equalize public library service in the State. Another measure would make mandatory the revocation of the beer license of any one who sells beer to an intoxicated person.

A public act, which probably would affect only Clay and Cherokee counties would extend tax exemptions enjoyed by N. C. electric membership to similar out-of-state organizations serving N. C. towns and rural communities. This bill was designed to give tax relief to Carolinians served by the Blue Ridge Electric Association.

A measure was offered to dispense with the requirement that the Holy Bible be kissed in taking oaths. Another bill would provide for purchase, by the State of \$20,000 worth of pocket editions of the New Testament, to be given to army draftees.

Cleveland, Gastonia, Madison and Yancy counties would be moved from the Tenth to the Eleventh district, while the Tenth district would be made up of Avery, Burke, Catawba, Lincoln, Mecklenburg and Mitchell counties.

Other features of the reapportionment bill have not yet been ironed out. They deal with readjustment of the membership of the two legislative houses, and are said to be packed with political dynamite. Every plan thus far suggested has met with considerable opposition.

The reapportionment is mandatory under the Constitution, as a result of the recent census.

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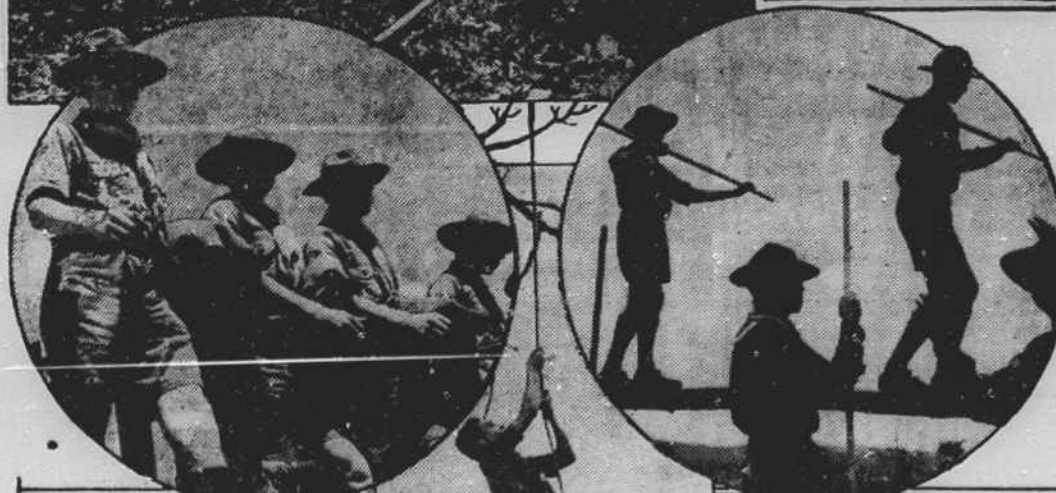
