AAA Signers Can Get Lime Early This Year, Announcement of Agent

County Agent A. Q. Ketner announced this week that all farmers who had signed for their 1941 lime allotment, or those who had not signed and wanted to, could receive this lime early this year by notifying him as soon as possible.

During the past the securing of lime has been a rather slow process, the agent said, but it can be gotten much earlier this year. Due to the slowness most of the farmers signed up for the lime to be shipped in the spring. If shipped then, however, railroad schedules will probably slow up delivery; therefore, those who want their lime before corn is planted should notify the agent at once.

Ketner also asked that all who had not signed their 1940 applications in the AAA program should do so at once in order to receive their payment checks. Between 200 and 220 have not signed these applications.

February Schedule Of Community Farm Meets Announced

The February schedule of community planning meetings for unit and area demonstration farmers in Cherokee county, has been announced by A. Q. Ketner, county agent.

A meeting of all unit demonstration farmers will be held in the Murphy courthouse at 8:00 o'clock February 13, for discussion of crop rotation, fertilization recommendations, farm records, and pasture, livestock and farmstead improvements for the new year.

W. B. Collins, district farm management supervisor, will head the program for this meeting, which will be conducted in cooperation with the county agents and the soil conservation and land use committee, composed of J. C. Townson, president, E. A. Wood, vice-president, and Lawson Lunsford, secretary-treasurer.

Shields Has Excellent Pasture Demonstration

A good demonstration on temporary winter pastures is being conducted by John S. Shields, unit demonstration farmer of the Culberson community, according to reports of County agent, A. Q. Ketner.

During the latter part of October, Mr. Shields seeded 20 acres of old permanent pasture with a mixture of rye grass, wheat and rye. About five bushels of this mixture was seeded per acre, using a heavy small grain drill to do the seeding. This drill was heavy enough to scarify soil enough for the seed to catch, and at this time it is showing up an excellent stand. From observation on old pasture will afford as much grassing as one acre where a seed was prepared and seeded.
