Out-of-State fishermen don't seem to realize that license privileges are the same as for natives. Devereaux Birchfield, game warden, said this week.

In further explaining, Mr. Birchfield cited section 3 of the state anglers game laws, which states that all non-resident fishermen, regardless of age or sex must purchase a fishing license.

Many persons seem to think that children under the age limit may fish without license, he said, but this only applies locally and out-of-state fishermen are required to have a license.

(Continued from Page One) said the passenger trains to Murphy have been losing money for several years, and that the present deficit is about \$1,000 a month. He added that the railway is "paralleled by five or six scheduled buses, daily."

The truth is that only four buses run to Murphy, and none suitable for travellers who wish to get an early start.

Considering the income from passengers, express and mail, and the skeleton train crews employed, the claim of \$1,000, monthly loss also is questioned.
