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THE NEW TAX BILL

The toughest tax bill in American history will soon be sent to the White House for signature. It is designed to raise \$3,593,900,000.

It plans to raise this total partly by reaching down into income levels which have never been subjected to direct Federal taxation before.

Most important change was dropping income tax exemptions to \$1,500 for married persons to \$750 for single persons. This alone, according to Treasury experts should yield an extra \$303,000,000 annually.

Next in importance to the great middle class of citizens are the so called "insurance taxes." There will be a seven percent excise tax on auto mobile-makers (which of course will be passed on to the buyers) plus a \$5 annual "use" tax which is the same thing as a Federal license fee.

Wine taxes will be almost doubled and taxes on hard liquors will be upped \$3 to \$4 a gallon.

Ten per cent taxes will be levied on local phone bills, theater tickets, radios, musical instruments, sporting goods, household equipment, etc., etc. All this in addition to the constantly rising retail prices of everything you buy.

Surtax rates will be high, ranging from ten per cent, which must be added to the normal four per cent in the lowest bracket, to 81 per cent in the top brackets.

Finally, though the little fellow is hard hit, the big boys are given an even harder wallop. Present corporation taxes will be retained, and in addition surtaxes of six per cent will be added on the first \$25,000 net income and seven per cent on income above that amount.

The first \$20,000 of excess profits will be subjected to a tax of 35 per cent instead of the old 25, and the rate will go up until it reaches 60 per cent on excess profits over \$500,000. Present rate on that level is only 50 per cent.

Heavy as this tax bill is, few believe it will prove adequate. Soon our spending, for arms alone, will reach \$3,000,000,000 a month—nearly as much as the new measure is designed to raise in an entire year.

Many an authority is convinced that next year, the Congress may have to pass another tax bill which will make this one seem mild by comparison.

So quit your kicking, Mister—"you ain't seen nothin' yet!"
