Light Wizard To Give Lecture at Andrews



Harry C. White, Scientist, will present a lecture-demonstration, "5000 Years of Light," in Andrews High School on Wednesday, September 9, at 11:00 a. m. according to an announcement by I. B. Hudson, Superintendent.

For fourteen years Mr. White was Supervisor of Industrial Relations of the Edison Lamp Works Division of General Electric. In this position he worked and associated with the pioneers of Edison and Steinmetz

and knew these men intimately.

Mr. White's program emphasizes the accomplishments of today's men of science and also those of the dark ages who helped combat physical darkness. Thousands of dollars worth of equipment will be used and a complete research laboratory will be carried. Mr. White demonstrates, and vividly portrays with word pictures, stirring scientific facts in this cavalcade of events.

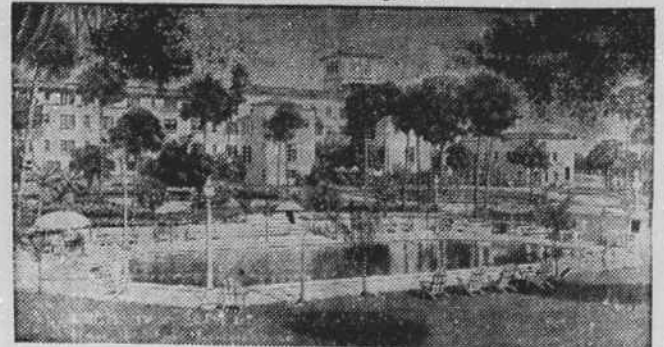
