Books Reviewed At Study Course Meet

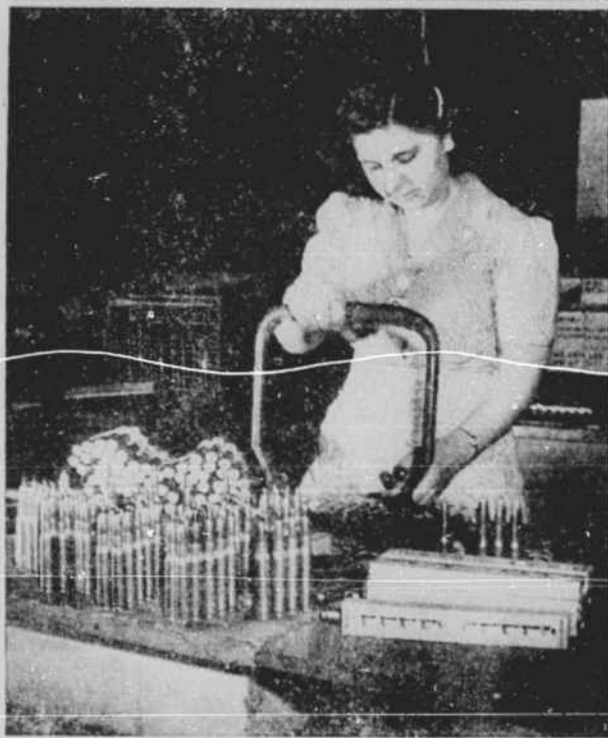
