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## SAMMY RUSSELL, ANDREWS YOUTH, 4-H MEAT ANIMAL PROJECT CHAMP

Sammy Russell, 18, senior in Andrews high school, is the 4-H state champion in the Meat Animal Project for 1942, according to word received from L. R. Harrill, state 4-H club leader. Russell was selected "on the basis of achievement in 4-H club work." Not only does Russell receive the honor of being state champion he is to receive a \$50 gold watch for his achievement.

In the letter of notification from club leader, Harrill, Russell was highly praised for his record. "The story of your club work is inspiring, and should be an inspiration to other boys," write Mr. Harrill. Russell's award was granted on consideration of his work over a period of three years. Three years ago he had as his project 2 Aberdeen-Angus calves which he took to the Raleigh state fair, selling these calves there for \$268. A year later he took to the state fair one short-horn calf which he sold there for \$160.00.

His project this year was two Aberdeen-Angus calves which he took to the Western North Carolina Fair. The two calves brought \$254.

Russell has been engaged in 4-H club work for the past five years. He states that he owes much of his success in 4-H calf projects to the assistance of Cherokee county farm agent, A. Q. Ketter.

Club champion Russell is the son of the late Sam Russell and Mrs. Russell. His father died about eight years ago. He lives one mile north of Andrews.
