to consider fall applications. Experiments have shown that when nitrogen is applied in the fall, the roots take it up and store it in parts of the tree where it be-comes available as the tree grows.

Also, the War Production Board has allotted material for 80 percent more power sprays and parts than in 1941 or 1942. But if growers wait until spring to place their orders for additional equipment, it be too late, so after barvest, the horticulturists say growers should look over their sprayer outfit and place their orfor needed parts with the

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
