# **Chances For Flight** Strip Lie With The Military Authorities

Hinduway Commissioner Percy Works commission the desire of Murphy citizens for a flight strip here, requesting that the officials contact the Federal Public Roads Administration in regard to making an appropriation for constructing a flight strip.

D. B. McCrary, acting chairman of the State Highway and Public Works Commission, wrote to C. D. Curtiss, deputy commissioner of the Federal Public Roads Administration.

His letter was forwarded this arek to Miss Addie Mae Cooke, by Ferebee who commented: understand that if a flight strip is authorized the cost of the land. as well as construction, is borne by the Federal Government

It seems that the request will have to originate with the Army Air Forces, at least as long as the war

Mr Curtiss' letter to Mr. Mc-Crary is as follows: "This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of November 1, regarding the interest of the citizens of Cherokee County, North Carolina, in the construction of a flight strip in that county.

"The Defense Highway Act of 1941 authorized the Commissioner of Public Roads to provide, in cooperation with the Army Air Corps, for studies and for the construction of flight strips adjacent to public highways or roadside development areas along such high-ways. At the present time, substantially all available funds under the Act have been allocated to specific projects whose construction is nearing competion.

The present flight strip protram is planned in cooperation with the Army Air Forces and as you know is being carried out with the assistance of the Engineers of the State Highway Departments. In the event an additional appropriation becomes available and it should be decided that flight strip in Cherokee County is essential from the viewpoint of the military authorities the Public Roads Administration will be glad to give mompt and full consideration to a proposal for its construction." his right hand in an accident
