As I stated to you, it is not necessary that you grade your collections of waste paper into the various grades unless you particularly desire to do so, as we will purchase the entire collection as Mixed Papers at \$14 per ton.

"As for the method of ship ment, we prefer that you make shipment in carload quantities. however, if you are unable to collect a minimum car we will be glad to have our truck pick up your accumulations of 10,000 pounds or more. The prices quoted are based on waste paper being properly baled or bundled so as to take up the least shipping and storage space.
