Cherokce county has exceeded is quota of \$202,000 in the Fourth War Loan, according to Chairman Percy B. Ferebee, who stated Wednesday that it is thought at least \$222,000 worth of bonds have been sold, even though the official treasury report is not pet receiv ed.

Mr. Ferebee stated that E bond sales in the county more than doubled the national average. The last report showed that \$110.118.75 in Series E had been sold, and the quota for that kind of bonds was only \$81,600

Use wooden box or some old container which will allow drain- age. Cover bottom of box with rough- age or coarse material sifted from the mixture. Finish filling box with sifted dirt. Pack firmly to make seed bed. Make ½ inch deep rows, 2 inches apart and sow 5 or 5 seeds per inch in the row.
