Health at a meeting held Monday Supt. Lloyd W. Hendrix, because of the epidemic of infantile paralysis in the state passed an ordinance prohibiting children under 15 years of age from attending any public gathering from now until September 18 or until such time as the State Board of Health recommends the opening of schools, and that all persons coming into the counties from restricted areas be quarantined for a period of 21 days from date of their arrival in the county.

Dr. M. P. Whichard, health officer, who called the meeting, was given authority to appoint a quarantine officer to serve during the emergency.

The ordinance in full is as fol-

WHEREAS, there is an epidemic of Infantile Paralysis in many sections of North Carolina and in adjoining States to such an extent that an emergency exists in nearby areas and it is necessary to adopt reasonable regulations to safeguard the health of the peo-

THEREFORE BE IT ORDAIN ED by the County Board of Health of Cherokee County;

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person coming into Cherokee County from restricted (infected) areas, that is areas infeeted with infantile paralysis, to be off their own premises for a period of twenty-one days from the date of their arrival in Cherokee County and all such persons are restricted to their own premises for said period ( . 1) me.

Section 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person fifteen years of age and under to attend any public gathering from this date until September 18, 1944, and the parent or person having custody of such child or children shall be responsible for the conduct of any such child in their cus-

Section 3. Any person violating any provision of this regulation shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and fined TEN DOLLARS.

Section 4. That the proper authorities be requested to appoint an assistant Quarantine Officer to serve during said emergency and to pay him Five Dollars per day for his services and Five Cents per mile for each mile nec essarily travelled in his car in the performance of his duty.
