People Requested Not To Ask For **Lumber Unless** For Emergency

In answer to inquiries nome owners who want to ke low they can get lumber a pairs, War Production Board ficials explained that the Federal Housing Administration is responsible for residential property, except farms, and therefore home owners should go to the nearest office of that agency for assist-

"But don't ask for lumber right now unless your case is one of ex-treme emergency and your home uninhabitable as a result of damage caused by fire, flood or some similiar disaster," officials "The demand for lumber for all purposes far exceeds present supplies. It is today the No. 1 critical building material."
