Noted Lecturer Tells Rotarians Of The Polish Underground

ANDREWS — Dr. Ignacy Alexandrovich was guest speaker at the luncheon meeting on Thursday of last week. He addressed an audience of Rotary members and their guests on the subject "The Polish Underground".

Dr. Alexandrovich, attorney-at-law, doctor of laws and political science, and noted lecturer on foreign affairs in Poland, who recently participated in the Round Table Conference at Colgate University on "Eastern Europe and the German Question," was of the opinion that the American people are physically and psychologically at a disadvantage concerning knowledge of the affairs in Europe.

As a member of the Polish Underground Movement who came to the United States in 1941, having escaped from Poland, Dr. Alexandrovich averred that of all of the countries of Europe overrun by the Nazis, Poland was the

only nation truly united in a common cause and a nation in which no Quislings could be found to set up a puppet government. As a consequence Poland has suffered most of all the occupied countries, but the Polish Underground is the most thoroughly organized in Europe, he advised. This Polish Underground not only consists of leaders and their followers, some of whom are but poorly armed, but also of the great masses of freedom loving people who are united with all the other underground movements in Europe by that one common cause — Search of Freedom. The underground movement is so thoroughly organized in Poland that it has its own parliament, courts, and other functions of government as well as newspapers, all underground.

Alexandrovich is at present assistant editor of the publication, "Poland Fights", an English language publication sponsored by the

American friends of the Polish Democracy.

Credit for securing this noted lecturer for the Andrews Rotary Club goes to the Rev. C. C. Washam, Chairman, and his Rotary Program Committee who have done much to publicize in deeds that true spirit of Rotary: "Service Above Self".

Hutchins To Hold Conference On September 10

ANDREWS — "The Gospel Changes Death from Sunset to Sunrise" stated the Rev. C. C. Washam in his morning sermon at the Methodist church here Sunday. He read to his congregation the first 17 verses from the first chapter of Romans. His morning text was from verse 16: "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ; for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth".

Announcement was made that Rev. W. L. Hutchins would hold quarterly conference on Sunday morning Sept. 10, and also preach at the morning worship hour.

The minister proclaimed the necessity for faith, and cited as examples of faith and works: Columbus, Nehemiah, John Knox, John Wesley, and St. Paul. Columbus had faith in his undertaking even though his crew was mutinous and disbelieving. Nehemiah believed that he would succeed. He believed in his task. John Wesley had required "a hundred men who fear nothing but God, and hate nothing but sin".
