

Reid West Of Andrews Member Of Gun Crew On Webb Miller Invasion Ship

The following story recently appeared in the New York World Telegram and was written by Henry T. Gurnell, U. P. war correspondent:

With United States Assault Troops, Normandy—Delayed—The name of Webb Miller, ace United Press war correspondent:

who was killed in a London blackout in May 1940, still lives in the invasion of Normandy.

In a front line area where German shells and rockets were crashing in green fields flecked with poppies I approached a military policeman of an airborne unit—Sgt. Pierre H. Levee of Kansas City, Mo.—a graduate of Columbia University Journalism school—to ask directions.

Sgt. Levee gave me the directions and then said: "I arrived on a transport yesterday afternoon named after a newspaperman you no doubt have known—Webb Miller." I told Sgt. Levee I not only knew and admired Mr. Miller, but that he had been my boss in the Ethiopian and Spanish wars which he covered. "I knew him too," Sgt. Levee said. "I was introduced to him in 1939 when he came to Columbia to lecture. He was a fine man and it is fitting to his great name that the Liberty ship Webb Miller should be one of the first transports to arrive off the coast of France."

Several hundred troops arrived on the Webb Miller, among them numerous other airborne MPs, including George Apen of 182 Green St., Brooklyn. Reid West, S-1 c. son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. West of Andrews, was a member of the gun

crew on the Webb Miller and has been overseas since March.
