Their finding of facts set out that Culberson is midway between Blue Ridge, Ga., and Murphy, that there are three general stores in Culberson, two rural routes running out from the postoffice there, and around 500 persons get their mail at general delivery; that according to two audits presented at the hearing by the L. & N. railroad they showed revenue received for the past six months period, the commission did not find that the Culberson station is a burden to the railroad company, and the station is to remain as it is.

According to information received from the War Production Board, "Lumber remains a critical material. Production of lumber in 1944 is apparently expected to fall about 4 1/2 billion feet short of the preliminary requirements estimated. Mill and retail stocks are too low and badly broken and cannot fill the gap between the demand and the new supply." There has been a 70 percent decrease in the alotment of lumber to be distributed through the county AAA Committees. Farmers should use every available substitute for lumber. It is necessary that the consumption of lumber be held to an absolute
