

"No one Governor could appoint a majority of the State School Board under the provisions of the amendment

The setting up of the needed office of the Controller should be left to the Legislature and the ly be trusted to provide for a sound and efficient business administration of the schools.

"The provision for from the State at large is a more certain guarantee of representation of the minority party, as is just and in according with the fair and democratic traditions of our people.

"The amendment eliminates the requirement that a majority should be appointed with business and professional experience and gives more assurance of representation from agricultural, prefessional, labor, and civic groups as well as business and financial
