Mis. Hyde died Wednesday of last week. She left her apartment between 10 and 11 o'clock Wednesday morning and did not reurn home. Late in the afternoon, friends became alarmed when she failed to return. A search was started and continued until midnight Wednesday, was resumed Thursday morning, and continued until Friday morning about 8:30. when her body was found back of a pile of brush from newly cut trees, on a hill beside Hiwassee lake, across the lake from Lover's

Fred Brendle made the discovery of the body, only a few minutes after approximately 15 men started a foot by foot search of an area where she was thought to be Footprints found Wednesday night beside the lake and leading away from the lake, indicated that Mrs. Hyde had gone to this vicini-

Officers were called immediate y after the body was found. Sheriff L. L. Mason and Chief of Police Frank Crawford examined the body and found that the dereased's arm and wrists were cut. apparently with a razor blade found beside her. A box which was said to have contained a large quantity of headache tablets was torn up at her feet. Dr. B. W. Whitfield, who acted as coroner in the absence of Dr. Harry Miller who was ill, stated that she did not come to her death by any foul


