ANDREWS—A number of improvements have been made in the Andrews city schools recently. Some of these improvements and the approximate cost are as follows:

New piano for Marble school, \$195; new drinking fountains for the high school, approximate cost, \$60; also, the school auditorium has a new stage curtain, cost \$341.

A hundred dollars' worth of

new dictionaries have been bought and distributed to the various schools where the need was greatest.

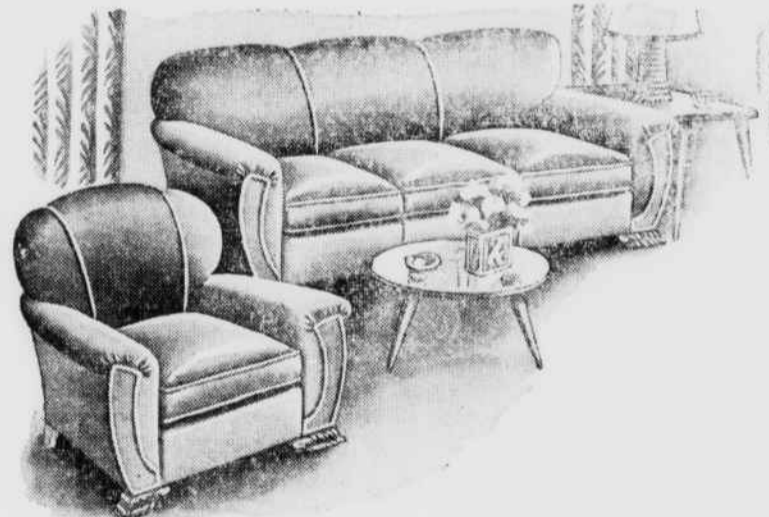

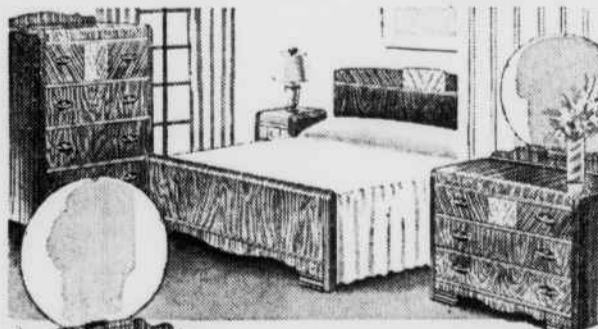
