The public is asked to comply fully with the order from the board and any consumer who violates the order is subject to penalties prescribed by federal law which includes the discontinuance of electric service at the direction of the board.

The usues of electricity which are prohibited are:

Outdoor advertising and outdoor promotional lighting.

Outdoor display lighting except where necessary for the conduct of the business of outdoor establishments.

Outdoor decorative and outdoor ornamental lighting.

Show window lighting except where necessary for interior illu-
