Rev. Ralph Taylor Rotary Speaker

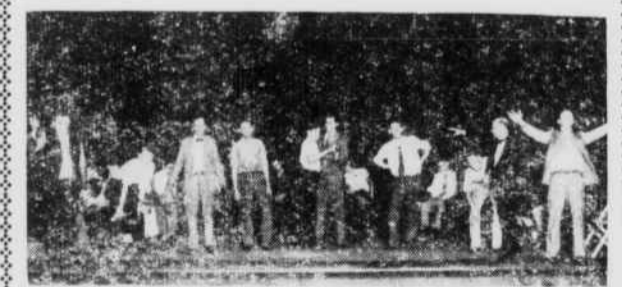
