CLOTHING COLLECTION STARTS APRIL 1

Sgt. Dockery was leading a patrol against an enemy position when he was hit by shrapnel from a bursting enemy artillery shell, which killed him instantly.

He was buried in a United States Army Force cemetery in the vicinity of San Fabian, Lazon, His burial service was one befitting

Sgt. Dockery entered service December 27, 1942 . He took his basic training at Camp Croft, S. C. He had seen action on Guadalcanal, New Georgia .the Russel and the Philippines. He was also stationed in New Zealand and was the holder of the Combat Infantry-
