The object of the clean-up campaign is to interest people in maintaining well kept homes, yards, gardens and buildings, as well as clean, attractive streets, and business houses.

To Take Fishing Census

Creel census has been started on Hiwassee Lake by TVA. One location has been selected on the lake and an effort will be made to collect records on all fishing at that location. The checking station is the Hiwassee Dam Dock.

By taking a record of the fishing over a period of three or four years the trend in the fish catch can be determined and from that trend conclusions drawn regarding the effect of the year-round open season and other information obtained which will be helpful in planning a fisheries program. The census will be taken during a period of approximately three months each spring. This period will correspond roughly to the former closed season period.

The studies to be made from the information on the census cards will form a basis for recommendations of measures necessary to improve fishing. Therefore, it is important that the records be complete and accurate . Every fisherman has a stake in this study.
