#### Local People Help Marble School Has New Desks, Make Atomic Bomb Picture Machine

Mr. Truman said in a voice tense with excitement: "We have just dropped a bomb on Japan which has more power than 20.000 tons of TNT. It was an overwhelming success."

The existence of the powerful weapon was announced personally by the president in a statement issued through the White House at 11 a.m., Eastern War time. That ene bomb carried more power than 2.000 B-29 Superfortresses normally could drop on an enemy city, using old type TNT bombs, it was said. This announcement brought great excitement to the whole world.

And the announcement that the atomic bomb is being manufactured at the plant of the Clinton Engineer Works at Oak Ridge, Tenn, which has been known as the "mystery plant" or the "hushhush" plant, was like a bomb dropped among the workers themselves, for not one person employed there knew what he was making.

In the past three years, the town of Oak Ridge, 18 miles west of Knoxville has grown from nothing to the fifth largest city in Tennessee, with a population of nearly 75,000, but during this time managed to become one of the historic cities of America, a town that will ever remain associated with the greatest secret project of World War II.

A large number of men and women from Murphy and Cherokee county have been employed on this gigantic project which has been veiled in secrecy, not knowing what it was all about.
