## Picklesimer Passes Away At Age Of 72

He took great interest in reading the Cherokee Scout which he had been reading for more than 30 years.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Perlie Croft of Farmer, Tenn., and Mrs. Lee Horton of Patrick, 14 grandchildren and eight great grandchildren. Funeral services were conducted at Pleasant Hill Church by the Rev. Drew Lunsford and the Rev. E. A. Beaver, both of Suit. Interment was in the Pleasant Hill cemetery. H. E. **MORE FARMERS USING LIME**  
During 1944, North Carolina farmers used 499,768 tons of liming materials, according to D. S. Coltrane, assistant Commissioner of Agriculture. Of this amount, 479,768 tons were ground limestone; 18,000 tons burnt lime;

2,000 tons, hydrate.

This represents an average of 71.4 pounds of lime per acre of cropland, said Coltrane.

In the nation, a total of 24,515,380 tons of agricultural liming material was utilized — an all-time high and an increase of 37.8 per cent over the 17,788,137 tons used in 1943.

The 10 Southern states used 5,481,591 tons of liming material last year.

## Obituary

### DR. GEO. WILLIAM DICKEY

Dr. George William Dickey was born near Murphy, North Carolina, May 24, 1880 and died August 18, 1945 at the age of sixty five. His boyhood was spent in Ranger, North Carolina.

He attended Junior College at Young Harris, Georgia and medical school in Nashville, and Knoxville, Tennessee. He received his medical degree, May 23, 1904 from Tennessee Medical College at that time in Knoxville.

The same year he went to Chance, Indian Territory where he began his medical practice. He moved to Westville, Oklahoma in 1910. His work was carried on almost without interruption for forty one years.

Dr. Dickey was married to Augusta Johnson, Chance, Okla-

homa. To this union four children were born; Mrs. Jack Miller of Westville, Mrs. Lyle Martin, Oak Ridge, Tenn., John L. Dickey, Los Angeles and Ahnawake Dickey of Ft. Smith, Arkansas.

Besides his wife and children Dr. Dickey is survived by three grandchildren, Paul Keith Martin, Diane Kathleen Dickey and Diane Charlotte Miller; one sister, Mrs. Tom Evans, Murphy, North Carolina, and one brother C. M. Dickey, Ranger, North Carolina. 6-1tp
