Washing Machines Soon Available

Consumers of Cherokee county will soon be able to get washing machines and ironers at prices generally in line with those charged for the October 1-15 period of 1941. It was announced yesterday by Chairman Fred Johnson of the Cherokee County War Price and Rationing Board.

"OPA has set dollar-and-cent ceiling prices on these articles and every one will bear a tag put on it by the factory", he explained.

Mr. Johnson said that this was being done "to make sure that inexpensive machines are available to families with limited incomes and is following the agency's announced reconversion pricing program."

The country has been divided into zones, the chairman disclosed, and the variance in retail prices will be on the basis of shipping costs to various areas.

In Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina, which are in Zone I, washing machine retail prices will range from \$29.95 to \$189.94; in Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee, Alabama, and Florida (Zone 2), they will range from \$34.95 to \$194.95.

"Every tag attached to a machine by the manufacturer must show the states in which the retail price applies, and that tag must remain on the machine until it is delivered into the consumer's home," Mr. Johnson asserted.

Individual pricing orders affecting the brands of particular manufacturers may be issued from time to time, he said, but added that the program outlined would be followed "in general".

Twelve Bear Hunts Are Scheduled

Twelve (12) bear and boar hunts are scheduled for the Santeetlah N. C. and U. S. Cooperative Wildlife Management Area on the Nantahala National Forest in Graham County. The areas to be hunted are as follows:

Unit No. 1, Big Santeetlah Drainage.

Unit No. 2, Little Santeetlah and Deep Creek Drainage.

Unit No. 3, Slick Rock, Bear and Barkers Creeks.

Hunting will be permitted for two-day periods as follows:

- Hunt No. 1, Unit No. 1, Nov. 1-2;
- Hunt No. 2, Unit No. 3, Nov. 5-6;
- Hunt No. 3, Unit No. 2, Nov. 8-9;
- Hunt No. 4, Unit No. 1, Nov. 12-13;
- Hunt No. 5, Unit No. 3, Nov. 15-16;
- Hunt No. 6, Unit No. 2, Nov. 19-20;
- Hunt No. 7, Unit No. 1, Nov. 22-23;
- Hunt No. 8, Unit No. 3, Nov. 26-27;
- Hunt No. 9, Unit No. 2, Nov. 29-30;
- Hunt No. 10, Unit No. 1, Dec. 3-4;
- Hunt No. 11, Unit No. 3, Dec. 6-7;
- Hunt No. 12, Unit No. 2, Dec. 10-11.

Checking Stations: Units No. 1 and 2: Game Protectors Station near Tapoco.

Unit No. 3: Game Protectors Station on Santeetlah Creek.

Each person participating in the hunt may kill one bear and one boar. No other wildlife of any description will be hunted or molested in any manner. Hunters will be expected to keep dogs from running deer.

Applications will be received only from persons who possess bona fide bear or boar dogs or who are in position to obtain such animals.

Successful applicants will be determined through an impartial public drawing to be held in Asheville by the Asheville Chamber of Commerce, this drawing will be designed to select twelve applicants and five alternates, there being a separate drawing for each unit depending on the wishes of the applicants as expressed in their application. If less than five of the twelve successful applicants are legal residents of Graham County, the drawing will continue until five are obtained.

A successful applicant will be permitted to invite not more than twenty-four persons to accompany him in his hunt. All persons, including the applicant, must, however, possess a valid North Carolina hunting license.

A successful applicant may take with him not more than 8 dogs.

All firearms except rifles using rim-fire cartridges, shotguns smaller than 16 gauge, and side arms may be used. Shotgun ammunition will be limited to the solid-load type.

Each applicant must submit with his application a cashier's check or money order in the amount of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) which will be returned if he is not chosen in the public drawing. Applications and fee must be received by October 20th.

The above fees will be made payable to J. H. Longshore, Agent, N. C. Division of Game and Inland Fisheries, 28, Law Building, Asheville, N. C., to be placed in a co-operative deposit in accordance with the provisions of the Wildlife Cooperative Agreement between the State of North Carolina and the U. S. Forest Service.

Participants will be notified through applications supplied them that the agencies conducting the hunt will be relieved of responsibility for injuries, either bodily or to personal property, which said participants may cause or sustain on the hunt.

A successful applicant with his party will be permitted to hunt during the daylight hours of one two-day period. No hunting will be permitted at night.

Smoking in the woods will be permitted only when the fire danger is low. Camp fires or warming fires will be permitted only in designated camping areas. The hunt will be conducted with-

Kent Watches Jap Capitulation

Aboard The USS Blue, Tokyo Bay. — (Delayed) — Horace M. Kent, fire controlman, third class, USNR, Route 3, Murphy, N. C. to-

day watched the final capitulation of the Japanese Empire from the decks of this Third Fleet destroyer.

The BLUE, the first 2,200 ton destroyer to join the Pacific Fleet last year, was anchored 1,000 yards from the USS MISSOURI, scene of the ceremonies. This triumphal event climaxed the BLUE'S 13 months of service with Admiral Halsey's fast carrier task force and the famous Task Force 58.

Until the entry of the victorious U. S. warships for the surrender ceremonies, the BLUE'S squadron of 9 destroyers held the distinction of having struck closer to the Jap capital than any other American ship, following a spectacular torpedo attack on a Nip convoy emerging from Tokyo Bay in July of this year.
