The A & H Flying Service of Asheville will conduct an air show at Murphy-Andrews airport on Saturday and Sunday, August 17-18. Manager Robert Heaton announces that loops, barrel rolls, spins, ribbon cutting and balloon bursting will be featured. The show is free, and people are urged to attend and witness this first air show in Cherokee county.

Passenger rides will be available in Twin and Single-Engine Aircraft. The planes and pilots are licensed by the U. S. Government.

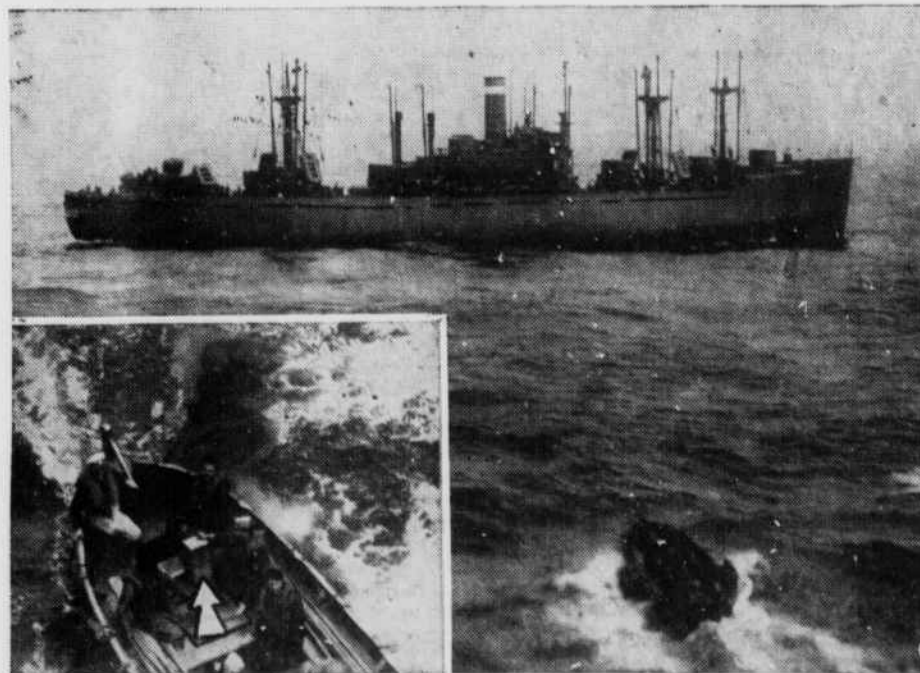
School Opening Postponed To 19th

ANDREWS — The opening of the Andrews City Schools scheduled for last Monday, August 12, was postponed until next Monday, August 19. This postponement was necessary for the reason that new replacement for two old worn out busses had not been received.

Delay in obtaining the busses resulted from a strike in a High Point plant where the bus bodies are placed on the bus chassis. Supt. Hudson states that school will open Monday, August 19, even though the replacement busses are not received, although the new busses have been promised.
